A HOME THAT HELPS AND HEALS

AWAKENED BY THE GIFT OF LIFE

sk Teresa Hoff what her favorite movie is and she will tell you empathically it is Sleeping Beauty. Unlike the Disney movie, Teresa's story is not a fairy tale and she wasn't awakened by a prince. Teresa was awakened by a liver transplant!

It all began at age 14. Teresa swam in a hometown lake which contained the e-coli bacteria. She spent the entire summer becoming increasingly ill and a visit to the doctor revealed a diagnosis of both Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. The course of treatment was prednisone and while not completely recovered, Teresa completed her high school career with honors. She entered the University of North Dakota, but grew increasingly ill. She was referred to Mayo

Clinic at age 19 and was told her colon would have to be removed. Teresa had the procedure performed and, amazingly, returned to college, graduating in 2005 with a degree in Physical Therapy.

It was during this time that Teresa learned she would need a liver transplant. Teresa confesses she felt abandoned by God and questioned how God could allow this to happen to her. But she clung to her confirmation verse: Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a future and a hope."

While this was an intensely difficult time, it was also a happy time. Teresa met and married her husband, Brad in May of 2005 and began her 1st job. A bout of cholangitis landed her back at Mayo Clinic and in June 2008, Teresa received her 1st life-saving liver transplant. Teresa felt immediately better and credits her recovery to Gift of Life Transplant House! In April of 2010, baby Liam was born and Teresa continued to thrive. She was enjoying being a mother and wife. Just as Liam was starting preschool, however, during a follow-up appointment to Mayo, Teresa suffered a massive seizure and remained in a coma for four days. Teresa will never know the reason for the seizure or coma, but she thanks her doctors and the transplant staff for helping her through this difficult time. During one of her follow up appointments, she learned that she would need another liver transplant. One year later, Teresa had still not received her liver and she made the decision to come to Rochester to wait. Teresa chose to stay at Gift of Life Transplant House where she had received such wonderful support during her first transplant. Months went by and still no liver and at Christmas of 2017, Teresa prepared herself to say goodbye to those she loved. She could feel herself dying and with no phone call saving a liver was available, Teresa made the decision that she was going to return home and spend her last days with her family. She sent her caregiver home, knowing her mother would be flying in the next day.

Then the miracle occurred that rivals any Disney movie – on December 28th at 9:30 am, Teresa received the call! A liver was available, and Teresa needed to be at Mayo Transplant Center as soon as possible. Since she was alone at the house, another caregiver drove her. Along the way, Teresa tried frantically to get in touch with her husband and mother, but was unable to do so. Her husband and son were driving to pick her up and her mother was in the air. Finally, just as she was being taken for her transplant, Teresa shared the great news with her husband!

After her first transplant, Teresa shares that she did not follow the advice of her doctors too well, however, this second transplant brought renewed determination to be an exemplary patient. Teresa exercises daily and is using her

HOPE AND A FUTURE

When Leslie Johnson and her husband Mark came to Gift of Life Transplant House last April, they were "randomly" assigned *Room 137*. Leslie had come to Mayo to begin the process of harvesting her stem cells in preparation for a stem cell transplant. But it wasn't her story that Leslie was interested in sharing with me – it was the story of *Room 137*.

As Mark and Leslie passed by *Room 137*, they noticed the memorial placard on the side of the door. It reads:

In Honor of Jay Tennessen

For I know the plans I have for you declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jeremiah 29:11

It was the story of Jay Tennessen that Mark and Leslie wanted to share with me.

Jay was just entering his senior year of high school when in September of 2004, he learned of his diagnosis of leukemia. Despite facing the rigors of treatments, Jay persuaded his parents, doctors and basketball coach to allow him to continue playing varsity basketball. Jay not only played but started at forward and was the team's second leading scorer. Jay's teammates were inspired by his determination to overcome his illness and continue playing. The Mustang's went on to the State tournament. A broken nose received from a mis-placed elbow during the tournament didn't deter Jay from taking the team to a 4th place victory and earned him all-tourney team honors.

Jay came to Mayo Clinic in April of 2005 to receive a bone marrow transplant and stayed at Gift of Life Transplant House. He had a goal: recover in time to graduate with his class. Jay realized his dream! During a family trip to California in July, Jay became ill and the family quickly returned to Mayo. Jay lost his battle with leukemia in September 2005, but the family wanted his memory to live on. So, they dedicated *Room 137* at Gift of Life Transplant House to Jay.

Mark and Leslie sent a photo to Tim Tennessen when they arrived and Tim texted back – "After all these years, Jay is still making a difference." Mark and Leslie knew Jay's parents, Tim and Cindy, because they recently catered for their son's wedding.

But there is one more connection Teresa Hoff, our front page article, was staying in Room 137 when Mark and Leslie returned in January 2018. Mark and Leslie met Teresa and in conversation, learned that Teresa's husband also knew Jay. They all marveled at the amazing set of circumstances that had brought them together and the significance of the verse that Tim and Cindy chose for Jay's memorial plaque.

Leslie received her stem cell transplant in January 2018 and she is grateful to Gift of Life Transplant House for providing a nurturing place for her recovery!
