

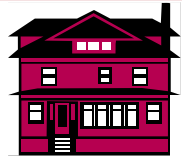

As Ginger and Nick took me on a tour, I sensed my dad walking with us.

It all started because of a freshman motivational speech assignment. As I pondered the subject of my speech, I thought about my dad who had recently been diagnosed with kidney failure. Though the diagnosis had come just before I left for

college, mom and dad had insisted I go. Letters from home came with words I had never heard before - renal, dialysis, fistula and while there was never a complaint, I understood the seriousness of what Daddy was facing.

I decided on the topic of organ donation for my speech. As I researched and prepared for my assignment, the thought slowly occurred to me that *I* could donate a kidney to my dad. I delivered my speech and that afternoon, I called dad to ask if he would consider accepting a kidney from me. Years later, my mom shared that she and Daddy had been praying that I would make that offer, but Daddy refused to ask me.

That was 40 years ago and despite a successful transplant, Daddy passed three years later from amyloidosis. I was hospitalized for one week, went home and played tennis the next day! Daddy stayed in the hospital much longer and when he and Mom finally traveled from the University of MN Hospitals to our home in Wisconsin, Mom returned to work and Dad was alone. While friends and

family came to visit, I can only imagine how lonely this time must have been for the two of them.

When I first heard of Gift of Life Transplant House, tears came to my eyes as I realized what a blessing this would have been to my parents. And as Ginger Holmes and Nick Pompeian took me on a tour, I sensed my dad walking with us. I am honored and humbled to serve as the Executive Director of Gift of Life Transplant House. In the coming weeks and months, I look forward to getting to know the amazing network of people, staff and guests who support, encourage and fulfill the vision of Ed Pompeian – to provide Mayo clinic transplant recipients and their caregivers a “home that helps and heals”.

Annual Walk of Remembrance and Flag Raising Ceremony

The Walk of Remembrance is held annually on National Blue and Green Day, which fell this year on Friday April 21st at 4:00 pm. The program is growing every year, and this year there was over 250 participants.

The day was warm and sunny with a slight breeze that was just enough to get all the Donate Life Pinwheels going in fine fashion which was the symbol of Donate Life Month this year.

The Pinwheel is symbolic of an instrument that turns obstacles into opportunities. The pinwheel's ability to capture and pass on energy parallels one's potential to make LIFE possible. Each Donate Life pinwheel has four sails supported by one stem, symbolizing the power one person has to be an organ, eye, tissue or living donor. For recipients, donation can turn sickness and injury into a second chance at life. For donors, their decision to register can turn a sorrowful time into a source of comfort for family as a result of renewed life for others.

The pinwheel reminds us that we all have the potential to capture and pass on life, comfort and hope to others by registering as a donor.

The Walk was led by the Veterans Color Guard and Mr. Craig Mann, beloved Bagpiper, both here in Rochester.

Carrying the Donate Life Flag is always done by families whose loved ones gave that precious Gift in years past. This year, the Steve Rasmusson Family carried the flag in honor of their son Tim, along with Shannon Hufstedler, mother of Skyler Hufstedler, a recent organ donor.

Esteemed speakers for the event were Mr. Ken Ackerman the Mayo Clinic Hospital Administrator, Pastor John Steer a donor father and head pastor from Autumn Ridge Church and Dr. Charles Rosen, Director of the William J. von Liebig Transplant Center at Mayo Clinic.

The culmination of our time together was with the celebratory Pinwheel Garden, led by Corinne Thul, a pastor at Saint Mary's Campus, Mayo Clinic Hospital. Families placed their Blue and Green symbolic pinwheels in prominent places around the Gift of Life Gardens giving it a warm and welcoming glow with everlasting memories of loved ones, and gratitude for the Gift of Life!

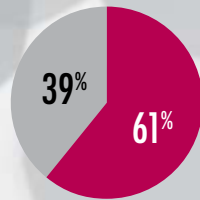

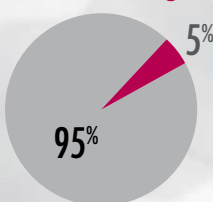

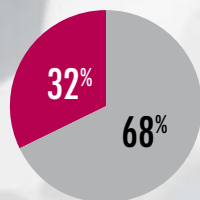
